Key Stage 4 English I/GCSE Literature

On this course you will read and write about a range of texts which are part of all syllbi for IGCSE English Literature: including prose, poetry, modern drama and Shakespeare. You will also learn how to structure and present an essay in the style required for I/GCSE English Literature.

During the course, you will have the opportunity to review the range of reading and writing skills you are expected to have mastered to be successful in English Literature IGCSE examinations.

The course materials will include texts from the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, and be taken from a range of I/GCSE specifications and set text lists.

Students studying MYP IB would also benefit from this course.
